

Types of Worksheets

TOPIC-CENTERED WORKSHEETS

The first worksheet centers around key points related to the topic using graphic organizers, fill-in-the-blank exercises, short-answer questions, puzzles, and categorization activities to help students review and apply what they have learned about the topic. Activities are intentionally varied so that formats rarely repeat from topic to topic.





NONFICTION BOOK WORKSHEET

The second worksheet focuses on the content learned when reading the nonfiction book for the topic. While it echoes the content emphasized on the first worksheet, it often directly references passages from the nonfiction book to ensure that students have read and comprehended the text.


FICTION BOOK WORKSHEET

The third worksheet is centered around the fiction book for the topic. It may ask students to identify major plot points of the fiction book to check comprehension. The focus is on how the plot and dialogue in the book relate to key points about the topic. Like the fiction book itself, this activity showcases how the topic can play out in a real-world scenario.


