## Pronouncing Consonants and Vowels

All the letters of the alphabet are symbols for sounds. There are two major groups of letter sounds in English. These two groups are called *consonants* and *vowels*.

#### vowels — a, e, i, o, u, and sometimes y

Vowels are *open* mouth sounds. You make vowel sounds with an open flow of breath.

CONSONANTS — b, c, d, f, g, h, j, k, l, m, n, p, q, r, s, t, v, w, x, y, z

Consonants are *closed* mouth sounds. You make these sounds by blocking your breath with your teeth, lips, or tongue.

All the letters in the alphabet are either consonants or vowels. The vowels are  $\mathbf{a}$ ,  $\mathbf{e}$ ,  $\mathbf{i}$ ,  $\mathbf{o}$ , and  $\mathbf{u}$ . The letter  $\mathbf{y}$  can be either a consonant or a vowel depending on the sound it makes. All the other letters are consonants. In most English words, a consonant makes its own sound.
